Fr. John's reflection for the Third Sunday of Easter 2020

The patron saint of our parish, Saint Peter, features prominently in the both the first and second readings from Sacred Scripture for this Third Sunday of Easter. He is quoted prolifically in the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles and is the author, or at least the dictator, of the second reading. The first reading, which has Peter speaking "On the day of Pentecost", sees the Church getting a little ahead of herself liturgically speaking, since Pentecost Sunday is still five weeks away!

However, it is the beginning of the second reading which really captured my attention as Peter says in his First Letter: "If you are acknowledging as your Father one who has no favourites and judges everyone according to what he has done, you must be scrupulously careful as long as you are living away from your home." In what sense are we in Sydney Australia living "away from (our) home" during the Corona virus crisis? I think the answer is obvious: we are living away from our true home which is the Kingdom of Heaven. The great irony is that the sooner we accept this divinely revealed truth, the happier we shall be living in this our temporary home.

In the gospel for Divine Mercy Sunday (last Sunday), Saint John recalls that eight days after the Resurrection the Risen Jesus appeared for a second time and said to Thomas and the other disciples present, "You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe." Obviously we are among those "who have not seen and yet believe." During this Easter season, Mother Church helps us to focus our prayer on the worship of this same Risen Lord, who is simultaneously the God we worship and the brother in human solidarity with us, because He shares fully in our common human nature.

In this Sunday's gospel for the Third Sunday of Easter, the two disciples recognise the Risen Jesus "in the breaking of Bread" whilst they were at table in the village of Emmaus. "Did not our hearts burn within us," they ask each other rhetorically, "as he explained the scriptures to us." Currently without this Eucharistic experience ourselves, do we experience a "Eucharistic hunger?" If so, this is not altogether a bad thing. We are led to realise and appreciate, perhaps more than ever, what we are missing: absence makes the heart grow fonder. That said, we can rest assured that the chief pastor of our Archdiocese of Sydney, Archbishop Anthony Fisher, is making every possible representation to government concerning the re-opening of the sacred spaces which are our church buildings and the resumption of Mass and the sacraments, under appropriate social distancing and hygiene rules.

In the meantime, in the middle of this wonderful season of Easter, we focus on giving thanks and praise for the glory of the Risen Christ. In this life, in various ways we catch glimpses of this divine glory. During this time "For as long as (we) are living away from (our) home", we look forward in great faith and hope not only to a continuous, conscious, explicit awareness of this same divine glory, but also our own participation in it. In the short term, we look forward to the resumption of our ultimate sharing, in this life, in the life of the Risen Jesus, for it is the Body and Blood of the RISEN CHRIST that we receive in the Eucharist.
